audiō, audīre, audīvī, audītus - to hear (audition, audible)

capīō, capere, cēpī, captus - to take, to capture (accept, receive, reception, exception)

cōgō, cōgere, cōēgī, coactus - to bring together; to compel (co + ago, agere)

constituō, constituere - to decide + complementary infinitive

dēbeō, dēbere, dēbuī, dēbitus - to owe, ought + complementary Infinitive

faciō, facere, fēcī, factus - to do, to make (fact, factual, manufacture, factor, perfect, Sp. *hacer*)

ferō, ferre, tulī, lātus - to bear, to bring, to endure (transfer, translate, melliferous, odiferous)

expugnō, expugnāre, expugnāvī, expugnātus (ex + pugno)- to attack

imperō, imperāre, imperāvī, imperātus - to command + DATIVE CASE

interficiō, interficere, interfēcī, interfectus (inter + facio) - to kill

narrō, narrāre, narrāvī, narrātus - to tell

noceō, nocēre, nocuī - to harm + dative case

parō, parāre, parāvī, parātus - to prepare (*semper paratus*)

pareō, parēre, paruī - to obey, to be obedient (+ DATIVE CASE)

pōno, pōnere, posuī, positus - to put, to place (position, apposition, exponent, expose, deposit)

rapīō, rapere, rapuī, raptus - to seize (raptor, velociraptor, rapacious, rapture)

vocō, vocāre, vocāvī, vocātus - to call (vocation, advocate)

veniō, venīre, vēnī, ventūrus (adventure, advent; *veni, vidī, vicī*)

amor, amōris (m) love (amorous)

arma, armōrum (neuter pl.) weapons, arms

bellum, bellī (n) war (bellicose, belligerent, antebellum)

castrum, castrī (n) fortification, (castle)

castra, castrōrum (neuter pl.) camp, military camp (castle, Manchester)

corpus, corporis (n) body (corporeal, corpus, corpse)

canis, canis (m/f) dog (canine, cavē canem)

caput, capitis (n) head (decapitate, capitol)

carmen, carminis (n) song, poem (charm)

celeritās, celeritātis (f) speed (celerity)

cīvitās, cīvitātis (f) citizenship, city-state, nation (civic, civilization)

consul, consulis (m) consul = chief elected magistrate of Roman Republic

cor, cordis (n) heart (discord, concord)

corpus, corporis (n) body (corpus, corporal, corpse, corporation)

consilium, consiliī (n) plan, advice, strategy

cōpia, cōpiae (f) abundance, opportunity; in the plural: troops, forces (cornucopia, copious)

dux, ducis (m) leader (duke, ducal, doge)

filius, filiī (m) son (filial, Sp. hijo)

frāter, frātris (m) brother (fratricide, fraternal)

imperātor, imperātōris (m) commander (emperor)

iniūria, iniūriae (f) wrong, injury (injury)

lūmen, lūminis (n) light; eyes (illuminate)

lūx, lūcis (f) light (fiat lux, Lucifer)

māter, mātris (f) mother (material)

mīles, mīlitis (m) soldier (military)

mūs, mūris (m/f) a mouse (derivative = muscle; cognate = mouse).

nōmen, nōminis (n) name (noun, nomenclature)

nūmen, nūminis (n) divine authority

opus, operis (n) work, task; work of art (*magnum opus*)

ōra, ōrae (f) shore, border, margine

ōs, ōris (n) mouth; face (oral, orifice)

os, ossis (n) bone (ossify)

oppidum, oppidi (n) town

pater, patris (m) father (paternal)

patria, patriae (f) fatherland (*dulce et decorum pro patria mori*)

rēx, rēgis (m) king (regal)

regnum, regni (n) kingdom, kingship, royal power

terra, terrae (f) land (*terra firma, terra incognita, orbis terrārum* = the world)

tempus, temporis (n) time (*tempus fugit*)

uxor, uxoris (f) wife (uxorius)

urbs, urbis (f) city (urban, suburban, urbane)

vir, virī (m) man, hero, husband

ācer, ācris, ācre - fierce, harsh, sharp (acid)

celer, celeris, celere -swift, fast, quick (celerity)

audāx, audācis (1 term. 3rd) bold

ceteri, ceterae, cetera (plural) - the other, the rest (etc. = et cetera)

amīcus, a, um - friendly + Dative

inimicus, a, um (+ DATIVE CASE) hostile, unfriendly

dulcis, dulce - sweet (dulcet)

fidēlis, fidēle - faithful (semper fidelis, fidelity)

fortis, forte - brave, strong (fortitude)

facilis, facile - easy (facile)

gravis, grave - heavy, serious (gravity, grave, gravitas)

īrātus, a, um - angry (at) + dative case

maritimus, a, um - maritime (*mare, maris* = sea)

omnis, omne - all, every (omniscient, omnibus)

parvus, a, um - small

sapiēns, sapientis - wise, knowing, sensible (*homo sapiēns*; sapient) Sophia est sapiēns.

vēlōx, vēlōcis: (adj.), swift, fleet (velocity, velociraptor)

in (preposition + abl.) on, in

in (preposition + acc.) into, against

ob (preposition + acc.) on account of, because of

olim (adv.) once upon a time

prope (prep. + acc.) near (propinquity)

quoque - also, and also
