**fetus, fetūs** (m) offspring (fetal, fetus)  
**fletus, fletūs** (m) weeping  
**fluctus, fluctūs** (m) wave (fluctuate)  
**gemitus, gemitūs** (m) groaning, a sigh  
**gradus, gradūs** (m) step; grade (gradual, graduation)  
**impetus, impetūs** (m) attack (impetuous)  
**impulsus, impulsūs** (m) impulse, shock  
**ictus, ictūs** (m) a blow, a striking, a hit  
**lacus, lacūs** (m) lake (Lacus Albanus)  
**luctus, luctūs** (m) mourning, crying  
**metus, metūs** (m) fear  
**monitus, monitūs** (m) a warning (admonition)

**occasus, occasūs** (m) setting, falling (occasional) from *cado, cadere*  
**ortus, ortūs** (m) a rising (orient)  
**passus, passūs** (m) step  
**peditātus, peditātūs** (m) infantry (*pes, pedis* (m) - foot)  
**portus, portūs** (m) port, harbour  
**ritus, ritūs** (m) rite, ceremony, ritual  
**senātus, senātūs** (m) senate  
**spīritus, spīritūs** (m) breath, life, spirit (*spiritus mundi*)  
**situs, sitūs** (m) place, position; decay (in *sitū*)  
**sinus, sinūs** (m) fold; bend; lap; bay (sinus, insinuation)  
**transitus, transitūs** (m) a crossing  
**versus, versūs** (m) verse (verse)  
**vultus, vultūs** (m) expression, face, countenance  
**vīsus, vīsūs** (m) vision, sight (vision)  
**usus, usūs** (m) use; purpose (useless)

**fidēs, fideī** (f) faith, trust, loyalty (*bonāfidē*, fidelity)  
**progeniēs, progeniēī** (f) offspring, progeny  
**maciēs, maciēī** (f) thinness  
**rēs, reī** (f) activity, event, affair, situation (in *medias res*, republic)  
**saniēs, saniēī** (f) diseased blood, bloody matter, gore, sanies  
**spēs, speī** (f) hope (*sine spē*) desperation  
**seriēs, seriēī** (f) row, chain; serious (serial)  
**speciēs, speciēī** (f) form, sight, view (species)

**numquam** (adv.) never  
**pridem** (adv.) long ago, long before

**sērō** (adv.) late, too late  
**sērius** (adv.) rather late, too late  
**semper** (adv.) always  
**simul** (adv.) at the same time  
**subito** - suddenly  
**statim** - immediately

**sōl oriens, sōlis orientis** (m) rising sun, the East

**sōl occidens, sōlis orientis** (m) the setting sun, the West

### Phrases and Idioms

**ad tempus** - at the right or appointed time  
**multīs ante annīs** - before by a few days, a few days ago  
**paucīs post diēbus** - after a few days  
**quam diū** = as long as  
**quam diū?** How long?  
**quam prīmum** = as soon as possible  
**ante lūcem** — before light  
**eō ipsō tempore** - at that very time  
**illā ipsā nocte** - on that very night  
**paulō ante lucem** - a little before dawn  
**longō post tempore** - after a long time  
**tribus ante annīs** = three years ago

**milia passuum CCXL** = 240 thousand of steps = for 240 miles - an accusative of extent of space with partitive genitive passuum
